In celebration of Pier Giorgio Frassati's 117th birthday, all the students of Frassati Catholic Academy came together at the Wauconda Campus for an all day Birthday celebration! The day was full of fun and reflection along with learning. The day also had a focus on service (in the true spirit of Pier Giorgio himself!).

The day began for the elementary students at Mundelein campus as they boarded a school bus to take them to Wauconda. After they arrived, they soon made their way into the Transfiguration Church joining the Wauconda Campus students for an All School Mass.

Frassati Catholic Academy's more than 300 students filled up the church! During the Mass the middle schoolers put on a play about Pier Giorgio Frassati's life during the homily.

After mass, all the grades split up to do

a whole bunch of activities throughout the day, many of which were designed to celebrate Pier Giorgio's life of dedication to serving others. Some of the activities were just designed to be fun!

The preschoolers from both campuses (who stayed together throughout the day) got to start in the gym with a snack and playing on the inflatable obstacle course. Then, after lunch they went down to the Music room for some time with Mr. Velez. They also did art projects in the elementary science lab followed by rest and story time in the preschool classrooms.

The Frassati 8th Graders spent most of their day in service to the other students by putting on their Service Fair in the school cafeteria. At the end of the day, after running the service fair, the 8th graders got to play on the inflatable obstacle course and "Meltdown". Learn more about the inflatable activities,

The other grades (Kindergarten thru 7th Grade) got to take part in a variety of activities at different times throughout the day. All those grades got to go to the 8th grade service fair at some point during the day. They also got to take part in the Trivia Game Show (learn more on Page 4) and do Art projects in the science lab.

Some grades had their own activities. K-1st got to do music with Mr. Velez. K-2nd grade got to do the "Bee Hive Book" activity. 2nd-5th grade did a Treasure Hunt. 3rd-7th grade helped make mats for the homeless (learn more on Page 4).

All grades had lunch in the PLC hallway at different points during the day (where it looked like there were a million pizzas). Everything culminated about 1:30 pm when the entire school gathered together again in the PLC gym and hallway for birthday cake! The school students even sang "Happy Birthday" to Pier Giorgio!

Pier Giorgio Frassati Fun Facts by Emma Roberts

Did you know...?

Pier Giorgio is the patron of the Bishop McGuinness High School in Oklahoma, where his family formally blessed the school in his spirit.

Frassati taught to always put others before ourselves saying, "God gives us health so that we may serve the sick."

One of Frassati's inspiring quotes is, "Suffering that is nourished by the flame of faith becomes something beautiful, because it tempers the soul to deal with suffering."

Frassati was a member of both the Third Order of St. Dominic and the St. Vincent de Paul Society.

The poor people of the city, whom Frassati helped, were the ones who petitioned to the Archbishop of Turin for Frassati's canonization.

Frassati had only one sibling, his sister Luciana Gawronska.

Pier Giorgio made his first confession on 20 June 1910 and his first communion on 19 June 1911.

Frassati made his Confirmation on 10 June 1915.

Pier Giorgio was an average student, but failed his exams in the year 1913. He was sent to a private school run by the Jesuits.

Frassati learned how to dance, but didn't like it as much as swimming or climbing.

Pier Giorgio's last words before he died on July 4th 1925 were, "May I breathe forth my soul in peace with you."

Frassati's Life of Service Cut Short, But Celebrated

Blessed Pier Giorgio Frassati was born in Turin, Italy on April 6, 1901. His mother, Adelaide Ametis, was a painter and his father, Alfredo Frassati, was the founder and director of the newspaper, La Stampa.

Later, in 1902, his sister, Luciano was born. Her birthday is August 16. In 1910, he made his first holy confession on June 20th in the Church of the Corpus Domini. He made his first holy communion in June 19th, 1911.

Frassati was an accomplished athlete and an avid mountaineer. His penchant for climbing is why Frassati Catholic Academy's motto is "Verso l'alto" which is Italian for "Reach for the Heights." During his life, he always had a sense of duty to help others, including the poor.

When he was only 24 years old he caught poliomyelitis. Some say that he got it from the poor. After 6 days of suffering, he died on July 4th, 1925.

In 1932, the poor of the city of Turin petitioned the Archbishop for Frassati to be canonized. Eventually, in 1990, Pier Gior-

gio Frassati, called as the "man of the eight beatitudes" was beatified on May 20th by pope John Paul II in St. Peter's square in Rome. There were thousands of people there to celebrate his blessed life.

Perhaps the 8th graders’ favorite part of the project was creating a game that represented their cause. This game would be played by the other students at the fair to

win tickets, and thus prizes.

After setting up their posters and games on the day of the fair, Frassati’s birthday, the 8th grade students invited all grades, one by one, to play games, learn more about interesting foundations, and have fun. Some of the innovative games and activities created by the 8th graders

were Twister, car races, basketball, a fishing game, slime buckets, a “Wheel of Fortune”, and even a Virtual Reality video game! After each grade was done playing, the students in that grade were asked to donate their nickels, dimes, and quarters to the cause they thought was the best.

The results of the fair were announced on April 9th as following: The Homeless Children’s Education Foundation raised \$9.30; Make A Wish raised \$11.01; Feed

My Starving Children raised \$14.34; The Damon Runyon Cancer Research Foundation raised \$15.05; The American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals raised \$16.88; The United Nations International Children’s Emergency Fund, or UNICEF raised \$22.03; The American Cancer Society raised \$25.57; The Wounded Warrior Project raised \$25.93; and winning with a total amount of \$36.96 was Alex’s Lemonade Stand Foundation for pediatric cancer.

Great job to all of our 8th graders and we can’t wait until next year!





Each grade was given a large variety of books to choose from, with different reading levels, genres, and styles. With the knowledge of the all the options, the students were then told to order the books from #1-10, based on their preference. Our ELA teachers, Mrs. Amy Kolozy and Mrs. Vicki Ziegler, then sorted the students into groups and tried to give each student their either #1 or #2 book.

The 6th grade class was offered the novels *The Hobbit*, *Hatchet*, *A Wrinkle in Time*, *Al Capone Does My Shirts*, and *Wednesday Wars*.

The 7th grade class chose from either *The Great Gatsby*, *Refugee*, *The Fault in our Stars*, *Out of My Mind*, or *Flight 29 Down*.

Finally, the 8th graders selected either *Out of My Mind*, *Night*, *Jurassic Park*, *Fahrenheit 451*, *After Ever After*, or *We Beat the Street*.

Every other day, in ELA class, the students selected for each book meet for a discussion. Each student has a certain job to complete each time the group meets. The jobs include a discussion leader, illustrator, efficient effector, summarizer, connection maker, and a sequencer. The students are required to complete a journal entry for each chapter describing the story as well as the characters’ emotions and thoughts.

Most of the student body would agree that the “Lit Circles” is a more functional system because it allows students to choose books they are interested in and are excited to read. Happy reading!
